

INTERNET SECURITY SUGGESTIONS

Whether at home or at work we need to be aware of Internet and computer security.

Perhaps you have heard the term phishing being used (pronounced 'fishing') which is an attempt to trick a person into giving up important personal or corporate information or even funds through means such as emails. Phishing is still one of the most productive ways for nefarious actors to gain information. Why go to the trouble of trying to hack a corporate or bank network when someone may simply give them the needed information?

There are variations of these phishing scams, most are very general with poorly crafted emails sent to thousands or hundreds of thousands of email users in a scatter gun approach hoping a small number of people will 'bite' and give up something important. Perhaps it states you owe taxes or a fine and instructs you to use the accompanying link to click on and pay. The infamous Nigerian email scams promising a big payoff for a "small" upfront transfer fee is a good example of this.

Other types of phishing attempts may be very pointed at a few or even one important individual in an organization or company. These emails are usually very well crafted to look and 'feel' as legitimate as possible and may appear to come from a legitimate sender. These recipients may be asked for anything from their log on credentials to supplying important files. Over the past weeks a scam was reported targeting company officials asking for W-2s on all employees.

Here are some things to keep in mind to avoid being a victim of email fraud. Most important is to simply be aware. Did this email come from an unknown sender? Does it ask me to click on a link or open an attachment? Am I asked to respond with any personal, financial or other sensitive information or am I asked to send money? Does this email invoke concern, fear or urgency? Any of these things should at least make you wary. These things are doubly true for any type of emails connected with our employer. No one here would ever ask for any type of logon credentials to be supplied back in an email and I would doubt any of our different vendors would either but these would be ideal avenues should a bad actor gain access and be able to spoof an email to appear to come from a trusted source.

Here at Boyd we practice proper personal protection when dealing with patients and our environment and that is not a bad analogy concerning our cyber life. Being aware and taking reasonable precautions will go a long way in protecting us as individuals as well as the hospital and our fellow employees.
